 For South Dakotans who have donned Navy blue from sailors on distant seas to
 officers at home this birthday is a tribute to their legacy of duty and vigilance;
- October 18: U.S. Navy Ball Holiday Inn Sioux Falls-City Centre, 100 West 8th St, Sioux Falls, 5:00 pm (CT);
- October 26: National Day of the Deployed, which honors those currently serving abroad.
 Every service member overseas is a son, daughter, spouse, or friend to someone back home. This day recognizes their sacrifice and the quiet strength of loved ones awaiting their return;
- October 27: Navy Day, which celebrates all who have served in the Navy's ranks, past and present; and
- Other notable remembrances include anniversaries such as the Afghanistan War and the Grenada Campaign, moments that have shaped global history and involved countless South Dakota families.

In South Dakota, the Department of Veterans Affairs works year-round to ensure that sacrifice is more than memory — it is woven into the fabric of our communities. From
